DRAFT Minutes June 21, 2025 Renton City Hall

1) Call to Order

SCA President Buxton called the meeting to order at 10:01 AM. Present were members Armondo Pavone, Regan Bolli, Troy Linnell, Katherine Ross, Vanessa Kritzer, Thomas McLeod, Nigel Herbig, Mason Thompson, and Chris Roberts, and SCA staff Robert Feldstein, Leah Willoughby, Andie Parnell, and Laura Belmont. Absent were members Mary Lou Pauly and Amy Falcone. Guest present included Bob Sterbank, Foster Garvey.

2) Public Comment

President Buxton asked if there were any members of the public present for public comment. Hearing none, this portion of the agenda was closed.

3) Approval of Minutes

President Buxton asked for any questions or concerns regarding items on the consent agenda.

In July of each year, SCA provides our member cities with draft dues for the upcoming year, for purpose of allowing cities to include in their budget planning. The membership will formally adopt dues at the SCA Annual Meeting, tentatively planned for December 3, 2025.

Proposed Rates

Draft dues are calculated using the proposed per capita rate multiplied by each city's 2025 OFM population, with a population cap of 100,000, in accordance with current SCA Board policies.

The proposed rate is adjusted based on the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W), Seattle-Tacoma-Bellevue, WA, June-to-June. The adjustment is capped at 5%, per existing Board policies. The CPI-W 12-month percent change for June-to-June 2025 is 2.7%, as recorded on the US Bureau of Labor Statistics website <a href="https://example.com/here-to-June-to-Ju

SCA issued a call for applications to elected officials from SCA member cities, as well as to city managers from contract cities, to fill three vacancies on a public safety roundtable. SCA received 18 eligible applications.

Hosted by King County Executive Shannon Braddock, the roundtable will bring together regional leaders to discuss public safety issues, successes, challenges, and potential solutions. The meeting will take place in person on Thursday, July 31, from 12:00 to 2:30 PM. A copy of the July 10th email invitation from Deputy County Executive Karan Gill, including the roundtable's main themes and other attendees is included in Attachment 8.

An outline for Board discussion (Attachment 9) follows the applicant materials and email.

Applicants, listed in alphabetical order by City

1. Auburn Mayor Nancy Backus

Applicant Statement:

As Mayor of Auburn, a city located in South King County, I am applying to join the King County Public Safety Roundtable to collaborate regionally on solutions to pressing public safety challenges—including those impacting our youth.

The summer of 2024 saw a marked increase in juvenile crime in Auburn, which has become a top concern for our residents. At recent town hall meetings, the message from our community was clear: they want action and visible leadership to address safety and support our youth more effectively.

In response, the City of Auburn has approved funding for 10 additional police officers. However, like many jurisdictions, we face serious hurdles in recruiting and retaining qualified candidates. This reality underscores the need for creative, cross-jurisdictional strategies and a renewed focus on community-based solutions.

We have also been working closely with the Regional Office of Gun Violence Protection. Auburn holds the unofficial record in King County for giving out the most lock boxes at one event - 500 at our Veterans Day Parade, and another 100 in under 25 minutes in the most recent distribution. Our community is eagerly looking for solutions!

I have been deeply engaged with the King County Prosecutor's Office on initiatives such as Restorative Community Pathways, gang violence intervention, and broader restorative justice efforts. These partnerships have shown the value of collaborative approaches that balance accountability with long-term community healing. I have also advocated at the County and State level for additional funding for public safety.

I bring a commitment to results, a strong connection to community voices, and direct experience in regional public safety efforts. I believe Auburn's perspective—and our willingness to innovate—can contribute meaningfully to the Roundtable's work.

2. Bellevue Councilmember Claire Sumadiwirya

Applicant Statement:

I am interested in representing the Sound Cities Association at King County Executive Braddock's Public Safety Summit because it presents a valuable opportunity for cities to inform the County about critical needs that could benefit from the new revenue authority authorized under House Bill 2015. With the potential to generate \$95 million annually through a dedicated public safety sales tax, this measure could support vital programs such as diversion, reentry, domestic violence services, and alternative crisis response. Cities should understand how the County intends to prioritize this new funding—particularly as it overlaps with the Emergency Medical Services Levy, the MIDD Renewal Levy, and recent sales tax changes approved during the 2025 legislative session.

Bellevue takes a collaborative approach to public safety by partnering with agencies across the region and maintaining high standards across police, fire, and emergency services. The City offers a full range of high-quality justice system services—from prosecution of misdemeanors and traffic infractions to equitable access to public defense and probation programs focused on support and accountability. For example, to foster a safe and positive experience for individuals and families using the new Link light rail through Bellevue, the Bellevue Light Rail Unit (BLU) actively partners with King County to ensure safety on trains and at all six stations located in the city. Collectively, our increased investments in criminal justice have led to successful outcomes, but the cost of delivering these services continues to strain city and county budgets.

As one of three appointed SCA representatives, I would bring member-city perspectives and large-city context to the table. For example, I could share how Bellevue is taking innovative approaches like the Community Crisis Assistance Team (CCAT)—a partnership between specially

trained, plain-clothes police officers and mental health professionals from the Fire Department's CARES program—is a leading example of an alternative crisis response model. CCAT has responded to over 500 behavioral health calls and successfully diverted dozens of individuals from arrest, incarceration, and emergency room visits, reducing harm and helping residents achieve long-term stability.

Participating in the Public Safety Summit will help ensure that cities have a voice in how the County maximizes new funding opportunities in alignment with community-centered public safety outcomes. It offers me the opportunity to advocate for regional investment in proven crisis response models and collaborate on broader system changes that promote health, safety, and equity across King County. Drawing on the expertise and insights from SCA-supported committees such as the Regional Law, Safety, and Justice Committee and the MIDD Advisory Committee, I am confident I can help ensure that the voices and priorities of cities are effectively represented.

3. Bothell Councilmember Amanda Dodd

4. Burien Councilmember Linda Akey

Applicant Statement:

Burien has dealt with some of the most difficult challenges in public safety including homelessness, gangs and youth shootings, police services including a co-responder program, street, sidewalk and lighting safety and more. These issues have stretched the resources of a very limited budget for staffing and services. As an elected official in Burien, I have committed to the safety and security of all Burien's residents and believe I bring a voice of a diverse population from a city dealing with big city issues and a small town budget.

5. Burien Councilmember Alex Andrade

Applicant Statement:

My name is Alex Andrade and have been on the council since Jan of 2024. As an elected official, small business owner, and longtime serial volunteer in Burien, I am deeply committed to our city's public safety conversations, where ever that may be. One of the primary reasons I ran for office was to ensure voice like mine were included in solutions that work for all of us.

Before transitioning to council, I operated a storefront on our main street in Burien until Oct of 2024 and had firsthand experience the impact public safety has on small businesses and communities. I currently am the council appointment on our Burien Economic Development

Partnership (BEDP), where I recognize that public safety and economic development work hand in hand, especially in a small city like ours (small city with big city challenges).

My involvement also includes having completed our Community Police Academy in 2023 and rapid response trainings, particularly in light of our current ICE activity. I've served on several boards and bring a strong commitment to equity, collaboration, and results and would love to be a representative at the Public Safety Roundtable to continue working with others across the region.

6. Carnation City Manager Rhonda Ender

Applicant Statement:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit an application for participation in the Public Safety Roundtable on July 31, 2025, 12:00-2:30 pm in Seattle.

I am the City Manager of Carnation, a King County Sheriff's Office contract city.

Carnation is a small city in the Snoqualmie Valley with a population of 2,300. In addition to our residents, we host approximately 1,400 school children and educators from both Carnation and Duvall and a very robust tourism economy. With a concert venue, amusement park and many upick farms, our visitor population adds up to 6,000 people to the community on any given day.

Another unique aspect of Carnation is we are downstream from the Tolt Dam and the entire city is in the inundation zone in the event of a breach of the Tolt Dam.

As a small rural community and tourist location, we have a unique perspective on public safety and would greatly appreciate the opportunity to share our voice with the roundtable.

7. Carnation Mayor Jim Ribail

Applicant Statement:

I'm very interested in participating in this public safety roundtable. Our city contracts with the King County Sheriff's Office for police services, and I also serve on the Sheriff's Advisory Committee.

Public safety in the valley presents some unique challenges. Our response times are often longer than in other parts of the county, and we're seeing a growing homeless population. One

of the biggest issues is the lack of access to services for these individuals. In some cases, people are dropped off in town under the assumption that services are available, but they are not. As a result, individuals end up sleeping in our bus shelters or near local businesses. Often, we don't learn about their presence until the next morning—delaying our ability to help connect them with the resources they need.

I'd appreciate the opportunity to be part of a regional discussion focused on addressing these issues collaboratively.

8. Kenmore Councilmember Nathan Loutsis

Applicant Statement:

Dear SCA Public Safety Roundtable Selection Committee,

I am writing to express my interest in serving in this role and highlight the relevant experience and perspective I offer that I believe would be beneficial for this discussion.

Nearly a quarter of crimes committed are at the hands of individuals under the age of 25. While this group makes up a significant percentage of offenders, they lack representation among decision-makers and institutions of power. Youth crime rates in King County have become a growing area of concern among community members—from small offenses such as vandalism and graffiti tagging, to more serious ones including carjackings and weapons possessions. While recent efforts have been made to address these troubling trends, there is still more that needs to be done. As a 23-year-old elected official, I see it as my duty to represent young people in my community, living among them and working to understand what is going on. When a discussion is had about public safety, and young people make up a significant portion of offenders, it is only right to include a young voice at the table.

Beyond my perspective as a young person, I have deep knowledge and experience with our local public safety system. As a council member in Kenmore, I serve as an alternate representative on North King County's Regional Crisis Response (RCR) Agency Principal's Assembly. This organization, a proactive initiative among local elected officials who want to improve how we address public safety, instituted a co-responder model among five partner cities, sending professional case workers to police calls that require a more human-centered, trauma-informed response to instances of food insecurity, housing insecurity, substance dependency, and mental/emotional crisis. This work has been transformative for our community by offering

people the alternative support they need. Kenmore is also a member of King County's Community Court, where we support individuals with minor offenses being offered a path in restorative justice that promotes personal improvement and deters recidivism.

Personally, I also possess extensive experience within our criminal justice system. For seven years, I was a volunteer with the King County Sheriff's Office, receiving extensive operational training from deputies and serving my community across the county. I spent many hours alongside deputies in both unincorporated areas and contract cities, learning about the enforcement systems in place and how criminal justice presents itself on the street.

For this discussion on public safety, I believe my perspective as a young person representing a demographic that often goes unheard in these conversations, my experience addressing our criminal justice institutions from a policy level, and having volunteered alongside our first responders for the better part of a decade and witnessed how our law enforcement system operates provides me a unique and unparalleled voice for this roundtable.

9. Kent Councilmember Satwinder Kaur

Applicant Statement:

I've worked for years to improve public safety and strengthen trust between the city and our diverse neighborhoods.

As someone from Sikh faith and a woman of color, I understand the importance of ensuring all communities feel safe, seen, and respected. I've supported efforts to expand community policing, invest in officer staffing, and grow alternative approaches like Community Court. I've also helped lead the city's work around equity and inclusion.

I'd be honored to serve on the King County Public Safety Roundtable as a voice for Kent—bringing our city's perspective, listening to others across the region, and helping shape collaborative solutions that reflect the real experiences of our residents.

10. Kent Mayor Dana Ralph

Applicant Statement:

As an active member of SCA, including the board, I understand how important it is for our cities be a part of the county wide conversations. The funding being made available to KC will be coming from our residents. We are all partners in the criminal justice system. King County's funding decisions will have direct impact on our residents. I would like to make sure our cities are a part of that conversation.

As mayor, I have been deeply involved in public safety at the city, county and state levels. I have advocated for this funding source for several years - a form of the HB2015 has been Kent's single legislative priority for the last two sessions. I have a solid understanding the requirements of implementation as well as where the current gaps our in our system.

11. Kirkland Deputy Mayor Neal Black

Applicant Statement:

I have a great deal of interest in the topics being discussed at the upcoming Public Safety Task Force Roundtable and a good deal of relevant experience. I'll quickly summarize my experience below, and hopefully my interest in topics related to the justice system, violence prevention, and public safety will be apparent..

I've been a councilmember in Kirkland for over 5 years. For most of that time, I've been an SCA appointee to the Regional Law Safety & Justice Committee. This year, I'm chair of RLSJC, meaning that I'm chair of the Committee and chair of the SCA Caucus of the RLSJC. I've been chair of the SCA Caucus of the RLSJC for 3 years.

Also, I've been a King County lawyer for nearly 30 years, and I am a leader in the King County Bar Association (KCBA). That has included 4 years as chair of the KCBA's Public Policy Committee and 6 years as a member of the KCBA's Board of Trustees. In those roles, among other things, I've worked directly with a series of Presiding Judges of the King County Superior Court on many matters, including the Court's human and financial resources and court calendars, in each case, affecting hearing schedules and access to criminal justice for both victims and the accused. I have strong relationships with Presiding Judge Shah, former Presiding Judge Ohishi, and Judge O'Donnell.

Further, I've worked on gun violence prevention on King County's Executive Leadership Advisory Group for Gun Violence Prevention (I'm currently an invited member) and also as a former member of the Board of Trustees of Washington Ceasefire - at the time, the leading organization in WA advocating for common-sense gun-safety legislation. In those roles, I've worked on, among other things, issues related to gun safety legislation, enforcement of existing gun violention prevention laws, local municipalities' options to reduce gun violence, and the impacts of new gun laws and enforcement on communities.

As one of the youngest elected officials in South King County, and the first openly queer person elected to Renton City Council, and a current member of SCA's Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB) Cabinet, I understand the importance of lived experience in shaping public safety strategies that serve all communities. I believe lived experience and policy knowledge go hand in hand, and I'm eager to contribute both to this roundtable as we seek regional solutions grounded in justice, accountability, and care.

1. D& O Insurance

We are requesting approval to exceed the adopted 2025 budget for Directors & Officers (D&O) insurance by \$152 for the year, in order to purchase an optional enhancement to move from a shared \$1 million aggregate coverage limit to separate \$1 million limits for each of the three coverage areas: Directors & Officers, Employment Practices Liability, and Fiduciary Liability. This enhancement significantly improves our coverage by ensuring that a claim in one area does not reduce or exhaust the protection available in the others. The additional cost is modest and can be absorbed within our available operating funds.

Recommended Action: Approval of an increase of \$152 for Directors & Officers insurance on the 2025 SCA Budget, in order to upgrade from a shared \$1 million aggregate coverage limit to individual \$1 million limits for each of the following policy areas: Directors & Officers Liability; Employment Practices Liability; and Fiduciary Liability.

2. Legal Fees

We are recommending a reallocation of \$25,000 from our board-designated legal reserve to cover legal expenses that were not included in our adopted budget.

a. Purpose

Our projected legal expenses exceed the original budget, and reallocating from the reserve allows us to meet this need responsibly, without disrupting operations or exceeding our budget authority.

b. Amount Explanation

To date, we have incurred \$8,705.68 in legal costs, which exceeds the original \$5,000 legal budget by \$3,705.32. We are recommending to reallocate the full legal reserve amount of \$25,000 now, in order to:

- Reduce administrative burden by avoiding repeated approvals
- Ensure we can pay legal invoices without delay
- Maintain transparency

c. 2025 Budget Impact

- The legal reserve line will be temporarily reduced to \$0.
- Net income for the year will decrease by \$25,000 to reflect the added expense.

- Legal reserve will be replenished from undesignated funds on January 1, 2026, to the designated amount of \$25,000, per Board Policies.
- d. Spending Above Reserves In the event that legal expenses exceed both the adopted budget and the \$25,000 reallocation from the legal reserve, we would return to the board to request a one-time authorization to exceed the FY25 budget. This would allow us to draw additional funds from the undesignated fund balance.

Recommended Action: Approval of the reallocation of \$25,000 from the board-designated Legal Reserves to the 6800 Legal budget expense line in the 2025 SCA Budget.

Finance Committee Recommendation

At their July 1 meeting, the Finance Committee voted to recommend to the SCA Board of Directors that the full amount of the maturing CD and earned interest on the account be reinvested into a new three-year CD with Time Value Investments.

Current Portfolio (TVI Investments):

- \$100,000 Capital One Bank USA CD 3.40% matures 7/7/2025
- \$109,000 Gesa Credit Union CD 5.25% matures 7/31/2026
- \$113,000 Oregon CMNTY Credit Union CD 4.55% matures 7/26/2027

Maturity Options

- 1. Reinvest **full amount of maturing CD** into new 1, 2, or 3-year CD.
- 2. Reinvest **full amount of maturing CD and earned interest on the account** into new 1, 2, or 3-year CD. Earned interest on this account is currently \$11,853.10. This would be rounded to the nearest \$1,000 (\$11,000).
- 3. Withdraw some or all.
 - a. Funds not withdrawn or reinvested are held in a Money Market account.

Previous Investment Maturity Action:

In 2023 and 2024, the Board directed staff to reinvest full amount of matured CD, and interest earned, into a new 3-year CD.

Current Rates

Harrison Stenburg, TVI, provided an estimate of best rates based on information as of 6/25/2025. He will follow up immediately before the July Board meeting with any changes, to allow up-to-date information before formal action is taken.

• 1 year CD: 4.20%

• 2 year CD: 4.00%

• 3 year CD: 3.90%

Both our HomeStreet Money Market Savings account and the TVI Money Market account (where any funds not reinvested are automatically held) are currently earning around 1.00% APY.

Stenberg provided advice that rates have fallen over the past year, as markets are expecting the Fed to lower their short-term rate soon, so recommends the longer-term CDs; specifically, a 3 year CD to continue the annual rung of maturities for the portfolio.

Our TVI investment account balance, as of May 30, 2025, is \$335,465.73, which closely matches our undesignated fund balance after accounting for expected expenses through year-end and reserves. The early withdrawal penalty on a 3-year CD is six months of interest, making it a relatively low-risk option, even in the very unlikely event that we fully spend both our budgeted expenses and all reserves. Maintaining the CD ladder remains a conservative strategy that provides stronger returns than the money market while preserving year-to-year flexibility.

Background

Transportation Benefit Districts (TBDs) are independent governments that fund and implement transportation improvements. The King County Transportation District (KCTD) is the county-wide TBD, governed by the nine King County Councilmembers. On June 2, the King County Council proposed a 10-year, 0.1% sales tax for transportation improvements, with proceeds split evenly between the Road Services Division and Metro Transit.

Under state law, the TBD Boards can impose a 10-year, 0.1% sales tax without voter approval and are not required to consult or seek input from other jurisdictions or governing bodies, such as the Regional Policy Committee. The 0.1% sales tax would be imposed countywide and would be in addition to the TBD sales tax, and vehicle license fees, currently imposed by the 19 King County jurisdictions with their own TBDs.

SCA Letter

At the June SCA Public Issues Committee (PIC) meeting, members discussed the proposed KCTD sales tax increase. In response to the shared concerns, SCA staff drafted a letter to the KCTD with the overall sentiment that (1) now is not the right time for a new sales tax, and (2) regional collaboration is critical before choosing a new transportation revenue option.

SCA staff shared the initial draft with SCA city intergovernmental relations staff for their initial feedback before sharing it with PIC representatives and the SCA Board. This approach mirrors our regional committee process, in which staff collaborate first to deliver the most informed work products and drafts to our elected officials. See the attached flowchart for more information on the drafting and approval process.

PIC Action

At their July 9 meeting the PIC discussed SCA's draft letter and initial proposed changes, as provided below, and shown in the redlined version in Attachment 17.

1. Yarrow Point:

- a. Changing "alternatives" to "alternative" in paragraph 1, page 1
- b. Removing "even" in paragraph 3, page 2

2. Des Moines:

- a. Tightening the language in paragraph 2, page 1
- b. Revising language in paragraph 2, page 2 to avoid redundancy
- c. Removing language in paragraph 3, page 2 for clarity around messaging
- d. Adding "that" in paragraph 4, page 2

3. Renton:

a. Adding "Cities across the region draw upon the same limited sources of revenue that fund essential services such as public safety, behavioral health, housing, street maintenance, and community programs. Without a coordinated and

Potential Board Action

The PIC unanimously recommended to the SCA Board of Directors the approval of the letter to the KCTD as amended, and to direct SCA staff to transmit the letter, pending Board approval. At the July 16 Board meeting, the Board will decide whether to approve PIC's version or offer additional amendments, as well as decide on the letter's signatory/signatories. If the Board approves the letter, SCA staff will transmit the letter to the KCTD signed by the designated signatories.

The Sound Cities Association is writing regarding the proposed 0.1% sales tax <u>under consideration</u> by the King County Transportation District (KCTD). Given the range of scheduled taxes this year and limited engagement to date, we are concerned about the timing and development of this funding proposal. With state and federal fiscal uncertainty, the proposed KCTD sales tax does not fully account for broader economic risks. While we understand and appreciate the deep and longstanding needs of the County's local roads and transit, we urge that any new tax be delayed, allowing time for alternatives revenue options to be thoroughly explored and policy priorities to be developed in partnership with local jurisdictions.

In 2025, the combined level of taxation for our residents and businesses is already high and is only going to increase this year with the new fiscal policies adopted and under consideration by the state and King County. First, Washington State anticipates raising an additional \$9 billion over the next four years with the tax increases they adopted this year from this year's tax increases, with much of that revenue paid by King County residents and businesses. Then, following the passage of the AFIS levy in April, and the potential passage of the Parks Levy and EMS Levy ballot measures later this year, the combined impact of all three levies cost property taxpayers around \$4 billion over the next six years. Given these the state and federal uncertainties, it is premature to impose a new sales tax and designate its use without further investigating other revenue sources and the scope and severity of the needs across both County Roads and Metro.

The thirty-eight jurisdictions of Sound Cities believe that the proposed KCTD sales tax should not be pursued this year, and <u>that</u> any new revenue will be <u>even</u> more successful with increased collaboration between King County and local jurisdictions. More time would allow for a thorough analysis of geographic needs, looking at alternative or additional revenue sources, and the development of appropriate solutions for a balanced approach to raising revenues that benefit the entire transportation system for the region.
